INSCRIPTIONS IN THE CEMETERY OF THE MIDWAY CONGREGATIONAL CHURCH, MIDWAY, GEORGIA

ON the main highway, some thirty miles south from Savannah, Ga., is the tiny hamlet of Midway, which arrests attention by its ancient church and the quaint, old, walled cemetery near-by.

These are the relics of an old town which has held a prominent place in the annals of the State, and within these walls have worshipped and been laid to rest many of the State's illustrious dead.

To this place came, in 1752, descendants of many of the founders of the Colony of the Massachusetts Bay, who left Dorchester, Mass., for Windsor, Conn., thence migrated (1696) with Rev. Joseph Lord to South Carolina, and finally received a grant of land at this spot on the Georgia coast. Many of them were followers of Rev. Francis Skelton, and among their surnames were those of several of the old Salem families, such as Bacon, Baker, Edwards, Graves, Lambert, Lord, Norman, Osgood, Stacey, Trask, and Winn. The first church was a log hut built in 1754, which was followed by another structure built in 1759. This church was destroyed by the British in 1778, and was replaced in 1798 by the present building.

The cemetery lies on the opposite side of the road from the church and is enclosed by a high, moss-covered wall, which was placed there between 1800 and 1814. It has been desecrated by the vandals of two armies, having been a scene of destruction both in the Revolution and in the Civil War. Many of the stones, unfortunately, have been destroyed, and many inscriptions have been defaced and rendered illegible. Within the enclosure lie many who, both in military and in civil office, have contributed to their country's growth. Here is the resting place of two signers of the Declaration of Independence, whose graves, however, can no longer be identified, Lyman Hall, who was the owner of a plantation a mile and a half north, and Button Gwinnett, who is noted principally for the rarity of his autograph. Here also lie, their graves marked by a joint monument erected by the United States Government, Brig. Gen. James Scrivens and Brig. Gen. Daniel Stewart. General Scrivens was mortally wounded at Spencer's Hill, a mile and a half south from Midway, on 22 Nov. 1778, while commanding the defense against the attack of the British. He was a grandson of Rev. William Scrivens, who founded the First Baptist Church in Charleston, S. C. He was a member of the Provincial Congress at Savannah, 4 July 1775, and was commissioned a brigadier general by the Legislature in 1776. Gen. Daniel Stewart was born 20 Dec. 1761 and died 27 May 1829. He had a distinguished military career and was a member of the Legislature. Martha, daughter of Gen. Daniel and Susannah (Oswald) Stewart, was married first to United States Senator John Elliott and secondly to Maj. James S. Bullock, son of Archibald Bullock, Patriot, President of Georgia at the outbreak of the Revolution. Their daughter, Martha Bullock, married Theodore Roosevelt, Sr., and was the mother of President Theodore Roosevelt.

Among other men of mark who are buried here are John Elliott, United States Senator, 1819-1825, Dr. Isaac S. K. Axson, pastor of the Midway church for seventeen years, 1836-1853, the father of the first wife of President Wilson, John E. Ward, first United States Minister to China, Commodore James McKay McIntosh, U. S. N., Lewis LeConte, father of Joseph and John LeConte, founders of the University of California, and John Lambert, the philanthropist.

In this picturesque spot, as perhaps in no other place, are mingled the two great elements of our Country, the sturdy Puritanism of the North and the romance and chivalry of the South; and here, under gnarled old oaks and trailing moss, peace and fellowship abide.

In this article is given, in condensed form, the genealogical information found on the gravestones in the cemetery at Midway. No attempt has been made to give the exact wording of the inscriptions.
